### Prayer is...

(Using Eugene Peterson's "Tell It Slant" as a resource.)

Jesus' stories about prayer get us active in a life of prayer.

In the first story of The Friend in Luke 11, Jesus uses the ordinary activity of going next-door to borrow bread for an unexpected guest as a description of prayer. Prayer is not mystical, it is ordinary. Prayer is not a technique you can learn. It is as simple as a conversation in friendship. Prayer is not only to be used in emergencies. It is as common as asking for and receiving bread in acts of every day hospitality. What takes place in our prayers to God is not so very different from what takes place all the time in our neighborhoods and families.

The second story of The Widow in Luke 18 helps us reimagine what we so often call "*unanswered prayers*" as something quite different. If we think the silence of God before our prayers is a matter of calloused indifference, think again. God is the exact opposite of the evil judge in the story, opposite in every detail.

Prayer is not begging God to do something for us that He doesn't know about, or begging God to do something for us that He is reluctant to do, or begging God to do something that He hasn't time for. In prayer we persistently, faithfully, trustingly come before God confident that He is acting, right now, on our behalf. We are His chosen ones and don't ever forget it. God is, right now, working His will in your life and circumstances. If you are afraid, pray, "*Jesus catch my heart.*" Keep praying and don't quit.

And this story of The Pharisee and Tax Man. This story blows wide open the hypocrisy of any so-called "prayer" that is not personal and ordinary, any prayer not embedded in the personal relational language of every day life and friendship. Prayer is when we welcome our Heavenly Father, sit down for dinner, and enjoy the time with Him. A time to share all our cares, concerns, and joys. A time of friendship.

Jesus said in Revelation 3:20, "**Here I am! I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door, I will come in and eat with that person, and they with me.**"

As comfortable as sitting at a meal with someone we want to be friends with is what prayer is all about. Jesus says our Heavenly Father is with us, is listening, and cares deeply about us. Now is a good time to enjoy that kind of relationship.

### Minutes in a Minute Clerk of Session Report ~ September 2020

COVID-19 has created a different way of doing things, and we at First Presbyterian Church are trying to further our mission of reaching our community through video. Since we began video worship service on March 22, 2020, the viewing units reached has totaled nearly 6,000, averaging 244 units per week. What a fantastic opportunity we have been given to minister through His Word to our community.

The Session members recognize this opportunity, and voted unanimously to proceed with securing and installing video equipment for live streaming video. Not only Sunday worship services, but memorial services, weddings, baptisms, etc. can be streamed live into your homes, or into Fellowship Hall, or into classrooms. The potential is almost limitless. We are seeking funding from PEF, donations, and mini grants. We have faith that this will happen in time for the Advent season.





# Church Life @ FPC

During the week of September 8-12, several members of our congregation participated in our Church's Fall Clean-up Week! Some of the tasks on the list were:

1. Grass & Weeds –
  - a. Weed-eater "Monkey" grass at Front Entrance of Church
  - b. Weed-eater (trim down) grasses in the side garden
  - c. Weed & general clean-up of the flower bed at entrance
2. General Clean-up of the side garden (remove leaves & cut down perennials)
3. Clean-up raised flower bed, especially on the south side
4. Spray Round-Up
  - a. Spray Bind weed in the rocks in the raised flower bed by the roses and Bermuda grass (on the south side) of the raised flower bed
  - b. Spray weeds in the rock at the SW corner of the Church by nursery entrance
5. Check drain pipes (gutters) for grass and leaves and raise the slope of cement splash drains around the church to allow the water to drain away from church
6. Trim all low hanging branches on trees that are interfering with walking & mowing under the trees.
7. Sweep curbs both north and south
8. Wash Stained glass windows outside the Sanctuary.

# We Fondly Remember Byron R. Brittain

*Byron's family asked to include this brief narrative regarding Byron's First Presbyterian Church affiliation.*

*Byron Brittain joined the congregation of The First Presbyterian Church when he and his family returned to Newton following military service in 1947. During his 73 years of continuous membership in the Church, he served in a variety of roles from usher to elder and as finance committee chair. He was a member of the planning committee for the design and construction of the current church building and played a significant role in securing financing for that endeavor. Over the course of the next sixty plus years, he added his voice to the church choir as a regular member only retiring from that activity when his hearing loss made singing with a group a challenge. While there will be few if any of his contemporaries left to remember or mourn his passing, the First Presbyterian Church and the church family was an important element in his life for many years.*

**Byron R. Brittain (1919-2020)** Contrary to his intentions, Byron Brittain (101) died in the early morning hours of August 29, 2020. His mind was ready for additional years but his heart was not. Born to Roy and Nina Brittain in Newton, Kansas on May 15, 1919, Byron attended Newton Public schools through his formative years and experienced the deprivations of the Great Depression and the height of the Midwest Dust Bowl.



Graduating from Newton High School with the Class of 1937, he moved to Wichita to seek his fortune and found it flipping patties in a burger joint where he made the acquaintance of Elizabeth (Betty) Kirk of Fredonia, Kansas, who had also come to Wichita to find work. There was a spark between them and they married in the summer of 1939 much to the surprise of both sets of in-laws and siblings.

After a brief attempt to sell appliances to resistant West Texas residents and after Betty went back to Fredonia in early 1941 to have their first baby boy, Byron eventually caught on at Boeing in Wichita where he was trained as a metal plater, fashioning hardened parts for combat aircraft as the country produced war material.

Byron enlisted in the U.S Navy in 1944 when a Naval officer and a Boeing manager approached him on the shop floor about the Navy wanting to put

Byron's metal plating skills to use right after completing boot camp in Idaho. Having a Navy base in Idaho was a point of amusement when Byron recounted his early Navy experience. Soon, however, he found himself and his small family in Norman, Oklahoma at another landlocked Navy base, this one a training center for carrier pilots. Byron set up a plating operation on the base and eventually, after adding another baby boy to the crew, he was sent to Memphis, Tennessee to set up yet another plating operation for the Navy. So much for the "Join the Navy and See the World" recruiting slogan.

Following his hitch with the service, Byron and family returned to Newton in 1947 where he launched a lifelong career in finance and insurance. In the summer of 1949, he and Betty added another baby boy to the family, apparently not figuring out the "x/y" chromosome secret to producing baby girls.

During a 60-year career, Byron was active in many civic groups in Newton. He was a Mason, an Elk, a Lion, a member of the American Legion and a Rotarian. At one point in the 1980's, he was President of the Kansas Association of Insurance Agents. For the last two decades of his career, he was owner and President of The Suderman Company, which he took over from his mentor and the retiring founder, Carl Suderman.

Byron was a fixture on Main Street in Newton where he never met a stranger, a good trait to have in the insurance business, because no one really wants to buy insurance. But sell it he did and he stood by his customers

in times of need. He made many friends in the process. While visiting Newton, his grandchildren decided he was a celebrity since he introduced them to everyone they met headed to the drugstore soda fountain.

He obtained his private pilot's license in the mid 1950's and, along with two other businessmen who loved to fly, bought a sleek four-seat single-engine airplane. It took very little for Byron to find a reason to go fly somewhere, often taking one or more of his sons to "run an errand". He eventually founded and became a Captain in the local Civil Air Patrol, which was based out of the Newton Municipal Airport. He once made a successful emergency landing in a farm field, much to the relief of the passengers and once skidded to a stop on the runway after failing to engage the landing gear. Oops!

One of his other passions was golf and for over 70 years he thrashed around the Newton Country Club (later Fox Ridge) and other courses far and wide, losing dozens of golf balls to the water and weeds. Undeterred, he spent uncountable dollars on new golf equipment, sure that the next great thing would be the solution. While his game never reached the level he wanted, he collected some trophies along the way, taught his sons and grandsons to play and continued to hit the links for a few holes well after his 100th birthday.

A talented baritone, Byron discovered the joys of Barbershop harmony in the 1950's. Forming and re-forming various local quartets. Byron and three equally talented singers eventually formed the "Cavaliers" and became one of the top competitive quartets in the nation. Rarely without a pitch pipe in his pocket, Byron would toot the appropriate note and the group would burst into song in the most unlikely places, often to the shock and/or pleasure of the other diners or fellow elevator riders. The quartet became a popular show group throughout the Midwest and they would pile into Byron's plane and be off to Omaha, Des Moines, Tulsa, Kansas City or wherever the aficionados of barbershop harmony were gathered. Byron's somewhat corny humor and instinct for "hamming it up" were the perfect match for their well-rehearsed headliner shows. The Cavaliers also went on an extended tour of the Far East for the USO during the Vietnam War, entertaining the wounded in hospitals across the region.

A fastidious wood carver in his later years, Byron created many beautifully wrought pieces of wildlife which he proudly gave to his loved ones and friends as gifts.

Byron is preceded in death by his wife of 61 years, Elizabeth, (1915-2000), an infant son, Barney (1944), his younger brother Robert Brittain of Houston and his younger sister Maurine Rutschman of Wichita.

Among others, Byron leaves a hole in the lives of his wife of 17 years, Janet (Jan) Brittain of Newton who Byron married April 26, 2003, his sons and daughters-in-law, Dr. and Mrs. William Brittain and their sons Aaron and Ben of Chesapeake, Virginia, Mr. Bruce Brittain and his wife, Mimi Breeden of Atlanta, Georgia and their children, Adam Brittain of Houston, Texas, Brooke and Ty Yount of Stafford, Virginia, Lindsay and Travis Thomas of Savannah, Georgia and Mr. and Mrs. Barry Brittain of San Marcos, Texas and their children, Jessica and Johnathan Burda of New Braunfels, Texas and Abby and Brady Johanson of Fair Oaks Ranch, Texas plus six great grandchildren, each one of whom Byron thought was great and grand and worthy of his love and support.

Due to COVID-related travel restrictions, a graveside memorial service will be scheduled some time in the future when those who want to remember Byron, tell stories on him and give him the farewell he certainly deserves can come together. Said service, when scheduled, will be announced via the Newton media.

# We Fondly Remember Martha K Knudsen

Martha Kathryn Knudsen, 93, died Sunday, (September 20, 2020) in Newton.

She was born February 19, 1927. She was the adopted daughter of Rex Moody, Newton, KS. She spent most of her childhood years with her foster family, Jacob & Marie Dester of Newton.



Martha graduated from Moundridge High School and went on to Northwestern University in Chicago, where she graduated as a Dental Hygienist. She worked 40 years in dental offices in Memphis, Tennessee; Wichita and Newton, Kansas (including the offices of Dr. Sheets, Dr. Gregg and Dr. Bette) before retiring in 1986. She married Ivan Knudsen on September 1, 1956; he survives of the home.

After retiring, Martha, who was a self-taught artist, found her passion for drawing, her specialty being pen and ink. She started with barns and windmills because they had straight lines and very little shading. Over the next couple years, she developed more of an architectural style of drawing. This led to a series of Kansas things: stone houses; schoolhouses; courthouses; churches; windmills and three sets of barn notes. She became known as the Kansas Barn Lady.

In 1991 she published her first Kansas Barn Calendar. She started with four different barns from different counties and then set out to find eight more barns from an additional eight counties. She ended up publishing 20 annual calendars, every barn different. She developed and published 4 Kansas Barn Book with barns from her calendars and as many histories as she could find. Barns from every county in Kansas were represented in her books. Martha was featured as one of "Hatteberg's People" in 1993 and was included in his book, "More Kansas People".

In addition to her drawing, she enjoyed spending time with her family, living on the farm and going to WSU basketball games for 61 years.

She was preceded in death by her father, step-mother, Kathleen Karlowski, foster parents and brothers, Robert Moody, Michael Moody, Jack Moody and foster sister Betty Boldenow.



Grades 6-12




